in 2014. Learning Gardens are designed as a catalyst for community-wide behavioral improvements in childhood nutrition, socialization, and student achievement in under-served neighborhoods across the country.

## Jim Wegner | Chief Executive Officer, Darigold

As CEO of one of the largest dairy processors in the U.S., Jim Wegner has led efforts to reduce consumption of water, materials, and energy, earning the inaugural U.S. Dairy Export Council Award for Sustainability from the Innovation Center for U.S. Dairy in 2012. Darigold's success is credited both to its innovative approach to engage its employees along with efforts to implement sustainability into daily operations. Headquartered in Seattle, Darigold, Inc. is the marketing and processing subsidiary of the Northwest Dairy Association, a cooperative owned by approximately 550 regional dairy producers. Since 2008, Darigold has been reducing its environmental impacts through supply chain efficiency, packaging reduction, water source innovation, and food safety.
